ALTERNATIVE SENTENCING WORKER PROGRAM HISTORY

Started in 2006 as a Pilot Project with 3 Social Workers By 2010 there were 11 Social Workers, but later this number dropped to eight due to lack of funding The 2014 General Assembly approved 15 more DPA social workers, bring the agency total to 23. By 2015 General Assembly approved an additional 22 ASW positions, bringing the total 45, with six of those positions being located in Louisville Metro-Defender Office An additional ASW was added to both the Boone County and Covington offices due high ASW caseloads Seven additional ASWs added, bringing the total number to 54 ASWs across the state

ROLE OF ALTERNATIVE SENTENCING WORKER

- Works as an agent of the defense attorney
- (6) "Non-lawyer assistants" shall:
- ...(b) Be subject to the Rules of Professional Conduct and the Rules of Evidence as they relate to client confidentiality, attorney-client communications, and attorney-client privilege.

All non-lawyer assistants hired by the department who are independently licensed or certified shall practice under the attorney-client privilege, irrespective of other obligations or duties arising with their independent licenses or certifications. Nothing in this subsection shall authorize the disclosure of confidential information to non-lawyer assistants within the department who are not performing duties at the direction of an attorney;

ROLE OF ALTERNATIVE SENTENCING WORKER

- Works as an agent of the defense attorney
- Conducts comprehensive assessments/social history
- Makes referrals
- Collaborates with clients to create individualized Alternative Sentencing Plans
- Builds rapport and gains clients' active decisions to participate
- Individualized paths to recovery
- Provides crisis intervention strategies

- Educates families
- Collects data
- Conducts baseline and 12 month follow up interviews
- Facilitates collaboration between agencies
- Creates and updates community resource guides
- Provides more detailed information about community resources, services, and programs
- Uses Evidence-Based Motivational Interviewing

Increases treatment engagement


Improves treatment compliance



ACCOUNTABILITY AND EFFICACY ALTERNATIVE SENTENCING WORKER PROGRAM

- Office Visits
- Assessment of Training Needs
- Monthly report submissions
- Approved plan audits monthly
- Coordination of Trainings for ASWs to ensure 12 hours of SUD training to comply with SB71
- Tracking of trainings for each ASW
- Facilitation of Training for Attorneys on How to Utilize ASWs Effectively
- Utilization of "qualified providers" provided by the Cabinet
- Independent outcome study with the Fletcher Group

ASW HARM REDUCTION PROGRAM

- ASWs statewide have Narcan kits as well as Fentanyl and xylazine testing strips within their Trial Office.
- ASWs are able to identify high risk clients due to the extensive interviews conducted and rapport built with the client
- ASWs will distribute Narcan to those clients at high risk for overdose, educating client on resources within the community and providing a list of treatment providers
- Clients at high risk are clients released from jail refusing treatment or without a planned treatment option





















BARRIERS AND GAPS

- Transportation for District and presentencing Circuit clients to get to treatment and other services.
- Clients with Medicare finding treatment placements-These clients often have health related issues in addition to substance abuse disorder
- Sober Living after client's complete treatment
 Some clients wish to remain near their family/counties
- Mental Health Primary programs
- Mental Health residential programs
